

# Reception and Year 1



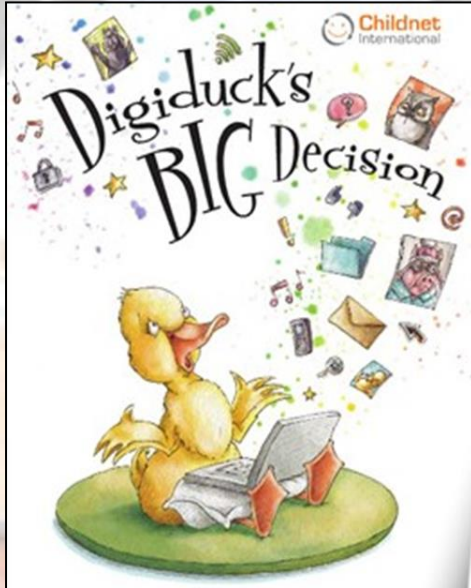
We learned how to ask an adult for help if we see anything we don't like or don't understand.

We learned how people can be upset by photos and messages people post on the Internet.


We made our own laptops with happy pictures and decided who we would like to share them with.

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# Years 2, 3 and 4

In poplar class we used the dilemma cube to discuss different e-safety scenarios. After this we then used role-play to show how we would deal with each situation.

You receive a message saying something mean about someone you know.  
**What would you do?**

You click on something by accident and it won't go away. You're worried that you may get in trouble.  
**What do you do?**

You have been chatting to someone on an online game for some time and they now suggest that you meet up. You have never met this person in real life.  
**What would you do?**

# Years 2, 3 and 4



In Beech class, we look at series of pictures and then discussed what scenario they were presenting. We used speech and role-play to act out the story. We learnt that if something unusual pops up on a phone or computer we should ALWAYS tell an adult.

# *Internet Survey*

- *In KS2 59 pupils have a mobile phone, while 42 said they use their parents.*
- *Majority of pupils access the internet, 42 use it in the presence of adults, while 60 state that they are in their rooms away from adult supervision.*
- *88 regularly play online games.*
- *19 have their own facebook account, 18 use their parents account.*
- *33 use other social media such as Twitter, SnapChat, Instagram or Tumbler.*
- *56 said that they regularly download things from the internet without their parents knowledge.*
- *34 pupils spend in excess of three hours a day on the internet.*
- *51 pupils said that they play games with an Entertainment Software Rating of 12 years or over, including games rated 18.*
- *Over half the pupils said that their parents are unaware of what they are doing or who they are talking to on the internet.*

## Year 6

Year 6 watched a short serious video showing the importance of thinking before you click. This video showed the consequences of not thinking before you click, where a boy sent a photo that was private and it went viral. We had activities to show us the importance of e-safety. We spoke about appropriate and inappropriate text messages. There was four messages one saying I'm coming over to play, another saying you look silly, another saying I love you and the last just had random characters. We discussed with the help of Mrs Asif what all the random characters meant and that it was just to see if the phone was active or not and never to reply to them. This led onto never carrying on chain messages. We all got given a wrist band at the end of the day to decorate and colour in. We all had a great day!
